
Synopsis

A painting haunts Joseph Koerner. It shows his grandparents before they vanished in the Holocaust. The film follows Joseph's return to Vienna to solve the riddle of their disappearance.

The painting lovingly details the grandparents' apartment, the private sanctuary from which they were taken and from which their son—Henry Koerner, Joseph's father and the painting's creator—barely escaped. With his father's painting as his guide, Joseph visits historians, architects, and artists who conjure Vienna's passion for homemaking—the apartments, bars, galleries, and sanatoria that are the triumphs of modern interior design. He enters interiors created by Gustav Klimt and Sigmund Freud that bring to light the dark recesses of the soul.

In the city's maze of archives, Joseph pursues the fate of his grandparents' home in the catastrophe brought about by the Anschluss—Adolf Hitler's 1938 annexation of Austria and the systematic destruction of the homes and families of Viennese Jews, who sought safe haven in the city after centuries of persecution.

Completed eighty years after the Anschluss, the film is a moving, visually-stunning journey through Vienna's urban and psychic interior to a buried past, when dreams of home became, for a city's most ardent homemakers, an unimaginable nightmare.




